Now, underline all of the items you've written that match a career in foodservice management. These may include enjoyment, success, and skills in areas such as producing a great meal, making others feel comfortable, motivating and teaching others, leading groups of people, solving problems, organizing the elements of a task, listening and communicating well, and working hard to see tangible results. It may involve talents such as strong interpersonal skills, culinary expertise, ability to meet deadlines, and creative thinking. See if your lists include an interest in health, nutrition, and food, too.

By now, you probably have an idea whether there is a match! A great career places you in the kind of job you can work hard at, feel good about, and find satisfying day after day... the kind of job that makes you look forward to going to work!

Exploring First-Hand

Another way to learn more about a career as a Certified Dietary Manager is to network with others. Talk with friends or acquaintances who have jobs in dietary management or related fields. See if you can visit them at work, or even “shadow” someone for a day to get the flavor of a job and its routines. Ask them what their jobs are like, and what their routines are at work. Ask what is most challenging and most fulfilling about the work. Ask what skills and talents they feel make them successful.

There are many ways to make contact. You can check with a local college where an ANFP Training Program is offered. Or, take a part-time job in a foodservice setting. Perhaps you would like to volunteer in a hospital, nursing home, or Meals-on-Wheels program. Any of these can give you more exposure to the types of organizations where foodservice managers may work. If you don't know anyone in these fields, you can also make contact with your state chapter of Association of Nutrition & Foodservice Professionals. (Check the ANFP website for information: www.ANFPonline.org, click State-by-State Info.)

Roadmap to Certification

Have you decided a career in foodservice management is for you? The next step is to prepare to become a Certified Dietary Manager, Certified Food Protection Professional (CDM, CFPP). More than a feather in your cap, this credential is recognized across the nation as proof of your competency in the skill-set required of nutrition and foodservice professionals. It is your ticket to career opportunities.

Step 1: Qualify for the Certification Exam

To become certified, you will first want to complete one of the pathways to qualify for taking the certification exam. Take a look at the list below, and decide which one is for you.

Step 2: Register for the Certification Exam

Offered twice per year, and in most states, the exam gives you a chance to prove your competency in the marketplace by earning the CDM, CFPP credential. You can check upcoming exam dates, review detailed instructions, and download an exam brochure and application on the Association of Nutrition & Foodservice Professionals website, www.ANFPonline.org. Or call ANFP at 800.323.1908.

Step 3: Pass the exam and complete your certification process.

Once you have passed the exam, you can apply for certified status. (Certification will be automatic if you are already a current member of the Association of Nutrition & Foodservice Professionals. However membership in ANFP is not required.) If you have not already joined the Association of Nutrition & Foodservice Professionals, you will receive an invitation to join and enjoy the many member benefits the association offers to you as a professional.

Pathway I: This pathway is for candidates who have graduated from an ANFP-approved foodservice manager program.

Pathway II: This pathway is for candidates who hold a two-year or four-year college degree in foodservice management or nutrition, two-year culinary arts degree, or two-year hotel-restaurant management degree.

Pathway III: This pathway is for graduates of a state-approved or other approved 90-hour foodservice course, who also have two years of institutional foodservice management experience.

Pathway IV: This pathway is for current and former members of the U.S. military who have graduated from an approved military dietary manager training program and have attained the grade of E-5.

If you haven't checked any of the four pathways, you may wish to enroll in a Training Program, so that you can prepare through Pathway I. For a complete directory of programs—with options for in-class, online, and correspondence—visit www.cdmcareer.info, and click Training Programs.

Earning your CDM, CFPP credential is a great way to launch your career. But now what? You will need to maintain your credential, and one of the requirements is ongoing continuing education (45 hours every three years, including five hours in food safety and sanitation). The mark of a dedicated professional is continuous growth and learning. Throughout your career, you will discover new trends in the industry, new challenges, and new techniques for getting the job done well. Continuing education keeps you ahead of the curve!

CDM, CFPP Career Checklist

- Complete all required coursework.
- Obtain the Certification Exam brochure online or from ANFP. Note the early bird deadline: _____
- Complete required application and return to ANFP.
- Check the exam brochure for study materials to help you prepare for the exam. Make a study schedule and stick to it.
- If you have joined ANFP, log in to the Member Community for support from other members during your exam preparation.
- Sit for the exam.
- Watch the mail for results (approximately 6 weeks).
- Follow additional instructions from ANFP to complete your certification.
